## ***From: The Sword of The Lord***

### **“ EVOLUTION:**

### **Anti-Common Sense, Prt 3”**

By T. DeWitt Talmage

*20 O Timothy, keep that which is committed to thy trust, avoiding profane and vain babblings, and oppositions of science falsely so called: 21 Which some professing have erred concerning the faith. Grace be with thee. Amen.*

- 1 Timothy 6:20-21 KJV

I am glad to know that while some of these scientists have gone into evolution, there are more who do not believe it. Among them is the man who, by most, is considered the greatest scientist we ever had this side of the water, Agassiz (Louis Agassiz 1807-73 Swiss-American, a naturalist & geologist who revolutionized the study of glaciers & paleontology. Authored studies on Fossil Fish. Was actively opposed to Darwinism).

Agassiz says,

*The manner in which the evolution theory in zoology is treated would lead those who are not special zoologists to suppose that observations have been made by which it can be inferred that there is in nature such a thing as change among organized beings actually taking place. There is no such thing on record. With equal vehemence against this doctrine of evolution, Miller, Faraday, Brewster, Dana, Dawson and hundreds of other scientists in this country and other countries have made protest. I know that the few men who have adopted the evolution theory, make more noise than the thousands who have rejected it.*

*Here is the glorious and magnificent theory that God, by His omnipotent power, made man; by His omnipotent power made the brute creation; and by His omnipotent power made all worlds. And five thousand scientists have taken passage on board that magnificent theory, but ten or fifteen have jumped overboard. “They” make more talk than all the five thousand who did not jump the ship.*

*I was politely asked to jump the ship with them. Thank you gentlemen, no. If you want to jump overboard, jump, and test for yourselves whether your hand was really a fish's fin and whether you were originally web-footed and whether your lungs were a swim-bladder. You few make that experiment, and I will observe.*

There is one tenet which it is demanded we adopt, what Darwin called “natural selection,” and what Wallace called the “survival of the fittest.” By this, they mean that the human race and the brute creation are always improving because the weak die and the strong live. They say the breed of sheep, cattle, dogs and men is always naturally improving. No need for God, Bible or religion, but just natural progress.

President Garfield finally died of his wounds in September of 1881, while his assassin, Guiteau was executed in June of the following year. Survival of the fittest? The martyrs, religious and political, dying for their principles, their bloody persecutors living on to old age. Survival of the fittest? Over 160,000 brave Northern men and Southern men meet at a battlefield, and around 7,000 died there for a principle. Did they die because they were not as fit to live as those who survived?

Evolutionists seem to think that God at the start had not made up His mind as to exactly what He would make, and so He has been changing it all through the ages. Evolution is one great mystery that hatches out fifty mysteries, and they out a thousand more, and those hatch out a million more. Why not instead, admit to the great mystery of God and settle with that.

If they truly want to claim that their father was a muskrat and their mother an opossum and their great aunt a kangaroo, my father was God. I know it. I feel it. It thrills through me with an emphasis and an ecstasy that all your arguments drawn from anthropology, biology, zoology, morphology, paleontology and all other –ologies can never shake.

We offspring of a gorilla, or offspring of the living God? The great question of this day. And all of us must give an intelligent answer.

In the first chapter of Genesis, we find that God, without any consultation, created the light, the trees, the fowl; but when He was about to make man, He called a convention of Divinity, as though to imply that all the powers of Godhead were to be enlisted in the achievement; “Let us make man in Our image...” (Genesis 1:26)

This was all to show the preeminence of man over the rest of creation - and the absurdity of evolution.



# “Built for Uphill”

I like to snack on something at night before I go to bed. Ok, I like to eat a few somethings, such as some chips, or popcorn, or some cookies or maybe some fruit snacks, or an apple. I definitely don't rule out ice cream, a popsicle or some crackers as other alternate possibilities. I would enjoy any of those tasty treats listed, in some combination together, be it two or three or maybe four various items in one snack attack. It's not healthy, but I'm hungry and it's there!

In the summer, I dean a week of middle school wilderness camp. During a wilderness week, we are far from the comforts of everyday life. I've spent camp weeks on the Buffalo River in Arkansas, on the Appalachian Trail in Virginia, in the upper regions of Michigan, in the mountains of Tennessee, the hills of Ohio, and the Current River in Missouri, all as part of these middle school weeks. They aren't the most arduous weeks, but they do make a person work! There's exercise every day, as well as work which is both physical and spiritual. Sometimes at the end of the day I'm flat-out beat. But you know, I'm almost never hungry at the end of those days (thirsty maybe, but not hungry!).

It's an amazing thing the way God has designed us to be able to carry on in difficulty. Honestly, we're generally, considerably, better off when we are working at something than when we are completely at ease. I once had as the theme for one of my weeks of camp, “*Built for Uphill*,” and the idea was that God did not mean for us to cruise through life with no challenges, so we should be prepared for them. And He was certainly meaning that in a more spiritual sense than in a physical one. My twist on an old saying is, “*If it doesn't kill you, it makes for a great story!*” While that may sound overly dramatic, in my experience it has been the truth, and while a story might seem like a small reward at the end of a long, difficult experience, what is our testimony, but the story of how we've made it through life with the help of God. That's what all of my good stories are!

When you're thinking about the risk you might take, or when you're thinking about the extra effort you'll have to put in, or when you think you're just so exhausted that you can't put one foot in front of the other, cry out to God! Ask for the vision and the ability to turn your situation over to Him, and see how He makes your strain and burden into a testimony of what He can do.

Incidentally, if you're looking for something that can get you to moving uphill, take a look at the church's service opportunities.

# America's Frontier Mothers in the 1800's

During this year of celebrating America's 250th Birthday, I also explore "Frontier Mothers" during this month's Mothers Day.

The Frontier life was hard on men, women and children, however, I dare say that for mothers most of all, it was very hard.

*(two mom's with their children, the prairie, 1870's)*



In one book I read, contained various portions of women's diaries. In one account, the woman stated that her husband decided that they leave Ohio for Oregon. She became pregnant on the long journey, and gave birth during the journey. There were no freeways, shock absorbers on the wagon, comfy seats, nor handy medical services along the way.



*(Mothers on Sunday, front of a modest log cabin.)*



*(mother and children had to live in and under the wagon till log or sod home was built.)*

While husbands were hunting game, building a permanent structure, a corral, a shelter for the animals, then tending to the task of farming or tending livestock, mothers were preparing meals, tending to the children in every way, cleaning and repairing clothes, tending to some measure of home schooling and when push comes to shove, defending the homestead and family.



*(A family in front of their "sod house.")*

A house made of sod was quicker to build and cheaper. Sod houses were typical across the prairie with sparse timber available. Sod was thickly rooted prairie grass, tougher than our modern lawns, though it was vulnerable to rain damage.

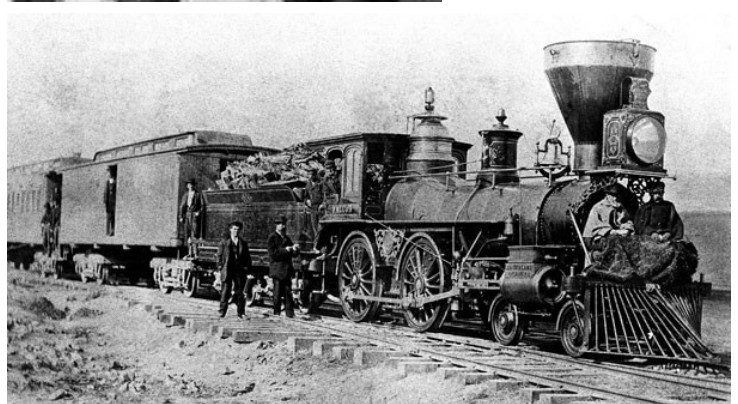

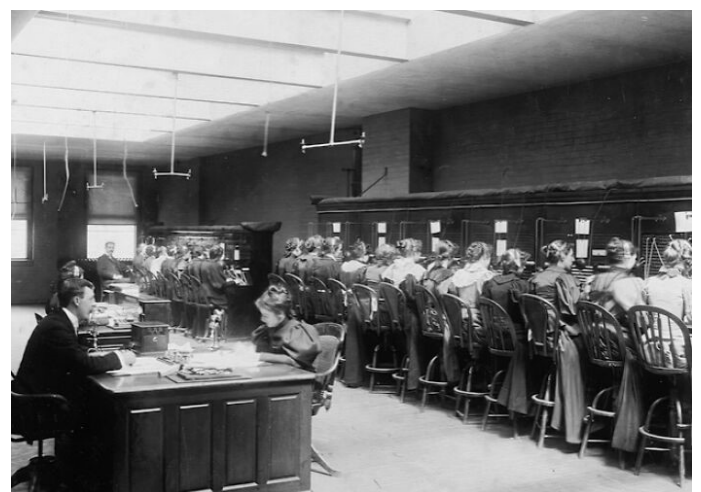

# Beginnings of the *INDY 500*

## Part of America's 250th Anniversary Series

The stand-out visionary for the Indianapolis Motor Speedway was Carl G. Fisher. His partners in this ambitious venture was James Allison, Arthur Newby, and Frank Wheeler. Carl Fisher's background was in highway construction, real estate development and entrepreneur in the young automotive industry.

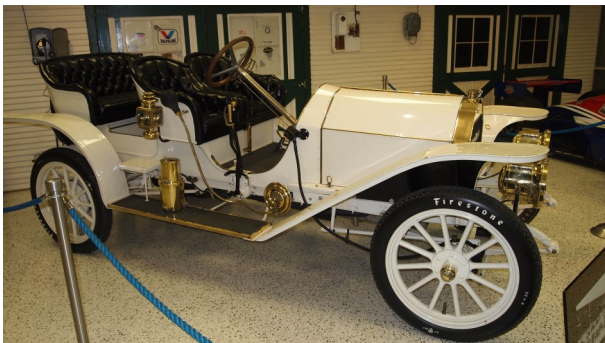
In 1909, the Speedway took shape with the laying of 3.2 million bricks, hence also the nick-name; "The Brickyard."

"Riding Mechanics" were part of the Indy 500 during the periods of 1911-1922 and again in 1930-1937. Riding on the passenger side, their role was to watch the other racers, hand pump oil to the engine and to manage fuel pressure. Past 1937, the technology of the cars eliminated the need for the riding mechanic, which in turn eliminated the added weight to the racer.

2026 will be the 115th Anniversary of the Indianapolis 500 – the first race took place in 1911, on May the 30th. 46 open-cockpit racers entered, with 40 qualifying. The racing formation began with five abreast. The race lasted a little less than 7 hours. The first 500 winner was Ray Harroun, clocking in at 6 hours, 42 minutes and 8 seconds, with an average speed of 74.6 mph. Ironically, Ray was the only racer without a riding mechanic, instead he opted to use a little device called, a rear-view mirror. The winning car was a 1911 Marmon "Wasp" from the Nordyke & Marmon Company.

The Indy 500 did *not* take place in 1917-18. Instead, during the war years, the Speedway was used as an aviation repair depot. Again during World War 2, racing was closed from 1942 to 1945. Due to this, the track fell into disrepair. Wilbur Hall, a 3-time 500 winner, went to business man Tony Hulman and convinced him to purchase the track. Tony bought it on November 14th, 1945. Wilbur would manage the reconstruction of the track and made it ready for racing in May of 1946. Wilbur would become the President of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway from November of 1945 till his death in 1954.

The "Pace Car" also made its debut in 1911 with the purpose of ensuring a safe, controlled "rolling start" for the 40 car field. The Pace car was a Stoddard-Dayton roadster, and the driver, Speedway founder Carl Fisher, who drove the Pace car from 1911 thru 1915.

# Personal Insights of the First Ladies Prt 3

Here, I go over some personal tidbits of the First Ladies of our nations history.

### *Helen "Nellie" Taft*

In 1886, Nellie boasted she would marry a man who would be President. It would be Nellie and William's father that allied to keep pushing "Big Bill" towards the presidency. 23 years later, Nellie got her dream, Big Bill became President in 1909, however shortly after, Nellie suffered a stroke. Not even that setback would stop Nellie from assuming her First Lady duties. While President, William took time to teach his wife how to speak again. Meanwhile, Nellie enjoyed the Oriental style of furnishings and this was reflected in the White House decor. Nellie also supervised the planting of the Cherry Trees, that were a gift from Japan. Nellie did recover and proved to be a most able First Lady.

### *Ellen Wilson*

Ellen and Woodrow were married 28 years when Woodrow stepped into the White House in 1913. Ellen made the White House a happy place for Americans to read about. As First Lady, she changed the upstairs Oval Room into a Family Room, filled with books and paintings. Unfortunately, Ellen passed in 1914, due to a liver condition. She had served with Southern grace and dignity.

### *Edith Gault Wilson*

In 1915, Woodrow Wilson married Edith in a private ceremony. Tragedy would strike again, when President Wilson suffered 2 strokes in 1919. He would be virtually closed off from Congress and the country with Edith controlling who would see her husband. This led to controversy with members of Congress not sure who was signing documents, Woodrow or Edith. This became such an ordeal, especially since the V.P. wasn't asked to step in, that Edith was labeled, "America's First Lady President."

### *Florence Harding*

It has been said, the Harding marriage was a fine partnership in business and politics. As First Lady, she reveled in the role. Florence threw garden parties, parties for Veteran's, political friends and visitors alike. However, despite the *Prohibition Law*, liquor did flow in the White House social affairs. When Warren fell ill and dying, she remained by his side. Some said in the day, that Florence's political ambitions for herself and her husband, may have cost her, her husband.

### *Grace Coolidge*

Grace would smooth Calvin's socially rough edges, while at home, Calvin would calm Grace's high spiritedness. Grace's background was in a teacher for the deaf. As First Lady, she helped lead the social affairs in a dignified but unpretentious manner. The Coolidge's were the first to light the ceremonial public tree. In 1931, she was voted one of America's 12 greatest living women.

### *Lou Henry Hoover*

As First Lady, Lou entertained elegantly funded social events and redecorating projects with "family money" instead of government money. She had a manner about her that treated everyone who visited with equal fanfare regardless of age, position or title. Later, Lou played a significant role in establishing the Girl Scout movement.

### *Eleanor Roosevelt*

As First Lady, Eleanor wasn't the quiet, shy type. Her mail rivaled in quantity to even previous Presidents. Eleanor went into mines, climbed to top of dams to meet Americans wherever they worked and witnessed their living conditions. She also held press conferences, gave radio broadcasts, wrote a daily syndicated newspaper column and was a strong voice for Civil Rights.

### *Elizabeth "Bess" Truman*

As First Lady, she disliked the spotlight and shunned the activist role. She maintained a low public profile. Yet, she was known to friends as a genuine "perfect lady," down to earth and resented the "pomp" surrounding the presidency. However, behind the scenes, Harry said of Bess, that she was his most trusted political confidante and secretary. Bess reviewed his speeches, and gave perspectives on various policies.

### *Mamie Eisenhower*

Mamie as First Lady, was a popular hostess, who also defined the 1950's style. She was known for her "Mamie pink fashion." Mamie ran the White House with a frugal efficiency. Mamie oversaw social events with a meticulous warm approach. The First Lady viewed her role as supportive to her husband, Ike. While she wasn't openly political, she supported women in the Republican Party and Civil Rights.
