From The Pastor's Desk:

"7 Practical Questions to Evaluate Your Church Ministry"

When was the last time you conducted a "ministry audit"?

It's always best to be continually monitoring and measuring the effectiveness of your church's ministries, but every two to three years it's good to take a comprehensive look at all of your ministries together. In this way, you will know what is working and what isn't.

- > Is each ministry healthy and productive?
- > Does each ministry operate in support and alignment of the others?
- > Are all the ministries guided by the mission and moving in the same direction?

When your church's ministries are functioning well together it's like a finely tuned orchestra that produces a beautiful symphony. At its best, it inspires people to want to be a part of the orchestra. On the other hand, if the musicians don't know what part they play, or can't play their part, or even playing a different symphony, the result is an unorganized musical mess. The dissonance is more than annoying. It can make good musicians want to leave the orchestra and music lovers will go somewhere else.

Here are 7 Practical Questions to Evaluate Your Church Ministry:

1) When did the ministry begin *and* Why was it started? Maybe at one time, the ministry served a significant need at the outset, but is it still relevant? Is there a sense of freshness about the ministry, is it thriving and growing in strength, reach, and overall impact?

2) How does the ministry support *and* advance the overall mission? Nearly any ministry in a local church can be deemed important and helping people, but that doesn't mean you should do it. Ask the question, how does it specifically support and advance the overall mission? Almost any ministry can be said to fit under the mission of the church, but relatively few actually help move the church forward when we consider the overall health and strength of the body of Christ.

3) Are the ministry outcomes greater than their input, energy and resources? Resources refers to time, people and financial. The question of input vs output is both a strategic question and one of spiritual stewardship of *resources*. One of the most common situations I see in churches is a tremendous amount of effort and energy invested into a particular ministry but with little results. It's typically exhausting and discouraging for all involved. One clear evidence of the presence and power of the Holy Spirit in any specific ministry is that the *spiritual* outcomes are *greater* than the human investment.

4) How would you assess the overall effectiveness of the ministry? Jesus was very clear in his teachings which included several parables about producing spiritual fruit. We have been given gifts, talents, opportunity and responsibility. The results of each of your ministries matter. Jesus also looked for specific things like faith, risk and obedience when it came to growing the early church and their ministry to reach people and change lives.

4) The elements of faith, risk and obedience in the operation of our ministries are as much about our growth as those we seek to serve. As power was unleashed into the early church, Jesus was always about maturing the body of believers and extending their reach with the gospel message. We carry the same responsibility.

What are your benchmarks for each ministry?

What are the agreed upon measurements?

Who is responsible for that assessment?

What helps you to know the ministry is working or is not working and is exercising good stewardship.

What is your impression of God's voice in the matter of each ministry?

5) Does your church staff and key volunteer leaders have the bandwidth to lead the ministry? You may have several good ministries that fit your biblical, missional and ministry philosophy construct, but if you don't have the leaders to lead them, it's wise to wait. Always invest in raising up new leaders before starting new ministries. The reverse, results in anemic ministries and tired and discouraged volunteers.

6) Could the ministry be continued by a volunteer but not under the church's responsibility? Every idea for a new ministry that someone in the congregation comes up with, does not need to be owned by the staff leaders of the church. A better approach is to empower the person with the idea to lead the ministry on their own. You can encourage them, give them some coaching, but it's up to them, not the church staff to provide the leadership to make it happen.

7) If the ministry was ended, what would happen?

This may seem like an unreasonable question, since any ministry can help someone. But it's a good question when we remember the principle that a lean and intentional ministry structure is much more effective than a random collection of ministries that a small handful of people feel passionate about.

When one ministry within the church is brought to closure it gives opportunity for deeper investment and greater results in the remaining ministries. The principle of focus multiplies each ministry's effectiveness.

“Finding the Will to Forgive”

“I want him to die the worst death ever and go to hell!”

That was the immediate response of Pauline Ayyad, when she learned that local authorities had identified and arrested the man who brutally murdered her husband.

Rami Ayyad was the director of the only Christian bookstore in Gaza City. On one particular evening in 2007, shortly after closing the shop for the day, he called family and told them he was with some bearded men and might be away for some time. That was the last they heard from Rami. The next morning, Rami’s body was found in a field. He was shot and stabbed numerous times.

Gaza has a population of almost 2 million, of which, 99.8% are Sunni Muslims. Fewer than 2,000 Christians live in Gaza. There are four denominational churches for Christians to pick from.



The bookstore that Rami served in was organized by the Bible Society of Gaza and located in the Gaza Baptist Church.

To support his family, Rami also worked in a bank.

Two years before his death, Rami sensed God calling him to lead a Bible Society ministry in Gaza called *“The Teachers Bookshop.”* The

church building where it was located, had received frequent threats, and been bombed on two occasions, so naturally, Pauline was concerned.

Pauline said, that while she was feeling fear, her husband was feeling peace. Once things got into motion and it became apart of their lives, Pauline’s fear left her.

A few weeks before Rami’s murder, he was threatened on several occasions. A local sheikh came into the shop and told Rami that he should convert to Islam. Rami refused, replying, *“I cannot make you be a Christian, and you cannot make me be a Muslim.”* Ominously, the sheikh responded, *“I know how to make you become a Muslim.”*

When Rami mentioned the encounter to his wife, his attitude reflected only peace and acceptance of the danger he faced.

But Pauline struggled to understand how he could be so calm. *“When he told me his story, he was happy!”* she recalled.

Rami had also relayed that some men he recognized were following him home. But since local authorities had done little about previous threats to the bookstore, he and Pauline felt there was nothing more they could do to ensure their safety.

On October 6th, 2007, around 4:30pm, just two days after the sheikh had visited Rami, the feared moment occurred.

Pauline, who was four months pregnant with her third child, was devastated. And she wasn’t ready to accept the reassuring words of Scripture, such as *“And we know that for those who love God, all things work together for good,”* in Romans 8:28. Pauline said she refused that verse back then, *“What good thing can come through killing my husband?”*

For months after the death of her husband, Pauline was very, very mad with God. She questioned why God allowed her husband to be killed, and also why he allowed them to be married. Pauline battled depression for the next five years.

Pauline never really let go of God, she would still struggle to look to God for strength to get through another day.

While working through her grief, Pauline’s anger shifted to those who killed her husband. Living in a predominate Muslim area, she heard the Islamic call to prayer five times a day, and each call from the minarets served as a potential provocation. Pauline’s anger turned to rage which blocked any road to forgiveness. In 2012, Pauline and her children attended a conference about forgiveness. It was there, that she studied from scriptures about this seemingly insurmountable task to forgive. Pauline’s husband’s approach was not condemning, he died for Christ, she needed to forgive for the cause of Christ. She made her peace with forgiveness.

In 2017, authorities arrested a man thought to have murdered Rami. He was also suspected in killing a Hamas leader, and some Palestinian police.

Pauline posted a public display of grace online in a statement of her forgiveness of the man who murdered her husband, and prayed for a blessing in his life.

Navaho Code Talkers Day Aug. 14th

The Native American 45th Division

Part of America's 250th Anniversary Series



Navaho Code Talkers Day:

In 1982, President Ronald Reagan established August 14th as a day to remember and honor the Navaho's for their contributions in World War 2.

Philip Johnston is credited as the originator of the "Code Talkers" idea. Philip was a World War 1 veteran, and the son of a missionary who grew up on a Navaho reservation. He was also one of the few non-Navaho people who spoke the native language. The structure of the Navaho language has hard to learn tones and rules, and it is an unwritten language.

In WW 2, the game of breaking the enemies codes was pursued heavily by the key nations of the Axis and Allies. The Pacific theatre was a key concern for the Empire of Japan and the United States. The striving to protect ones code while breaking the enemies code was also a determining factor in the success or failure of a military operation.

Early in 1942, Johnston met with U.S. Marine Corps leaders to perform a demonstration with Navaho men who could translate and send a message in 20 seconds, instead of the 30 minutes machines took. Philip had reminded the military leaders that Native languages were also used in World War 1 successfully. The military was sold on the idea, and began recruiting Navaho men.

An initial group of 29 Navaho men were formed to develop a code where common Navaho words were assigned to military terms, and letters were represented by specific Navaho nouns. This *Navaho Code* was never successfully deciphered by enemy forces.

Over 400 Navaho talkers served in the Pacific Theatre transmitting hundreds of error free messages during many pivotal military operations.

The Navaho's became an invaluable asset in winning the war against the forces of the Empire of Japan.

The Native American 45th Division:

During World War 2, the average American Division contained 14,000 to 15,000 officers and enlisted men. The 45th Division contained more Native Americans, over 2,000, than any other American Division. The Native Americans came from 50 tribes, primarily from Oklahoma, Arizona, New Mexico, and Colorado.

The 45th sported the "Thunderbird" insignia. The men were heavily drawn from Southwestern National Guard Units. The Division patch represents the following; The "4 sides" represents the 4 States that primarily Units were pulled from. The "red" honors Spanish history and early American settlers of the South West. The yellow "Thunderbird" represents power and strength. The insignia was designed by a Kiowa artist, Woody Big Bow, and was approved in 1939.

The 45th Division was a busy combat Division, participating in operations in Sicily, Naples-Foggia, Anzio, Rome-Arno, Southern France, the Rhineland, and Central Europe. The 45th put in 511 combat days. Units of the 45th were also there to liberate the Dachau concentration camp.

General Patton gave his praise of the 45th saying, "*The 45th Infantry Division is one of the best, if not the best division in the history of American arms.*"

Several members of the 45th received the Congressional Medal of Honor, among them were Ernest Childers (Creek), Jack Montgomery (Cherokee), & Van T. Barfoot (Choctaw).

All glory to God the Father, our creator and redeemer, who brought us together and gave us new life.

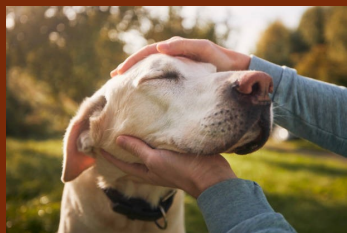

August 26th

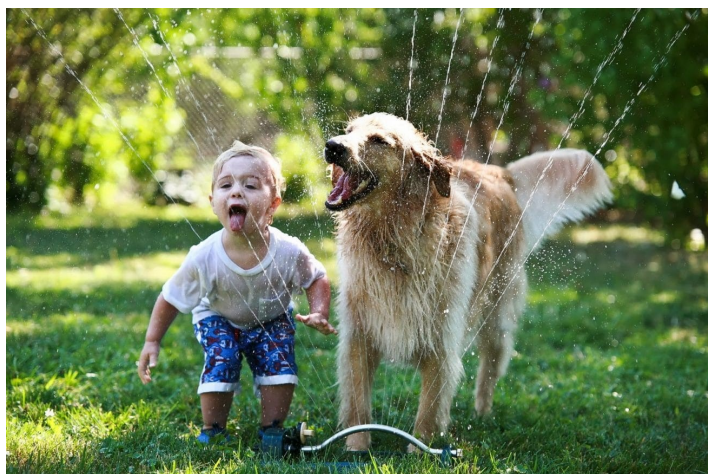


One of God's wondrous creations was and is the dog, or K-9, often referred to with affection as "man's best friend."

7. If you are unable to shop for boxes and wish to help, please donate to the "Shoebox Fund" to help defer the \$10 shipping cost for others.

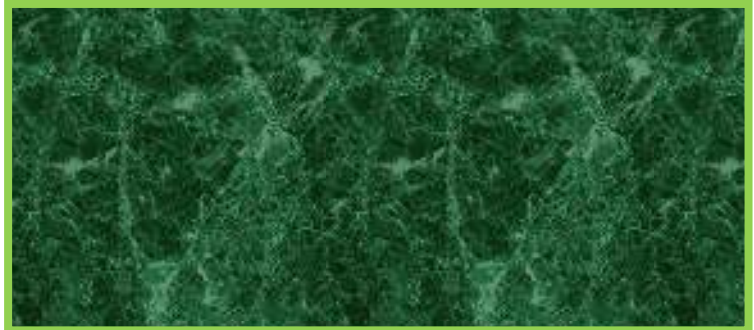
